# Dress Code

Appropriate attire and appearance is necessary to be prepared for college and careers. As such, Edison High School enforces a dress code that promotes safety and a healthy learning environment free from distraction. Please familiarize yourself with the dress code. Students who fail to meet expectations for dress code will be sent to Administration South to change the article that is out of compliance and leave it there until the end of the school day. If no options are available for the student to correct the issue, parents will be contacted to come to the school to rectify the problem in order for the student to return to class. Defiance on the part of students during this process may lead to further disciplinary measures by administration. Please take advantage of instructional time by adhering to the dress code. This dress code is for the 2021-2022 school year, as put forth by the Fresno Unified School District follows (FUSD):

“Students' clothing must not present a health or safety hazard or interfere with the educational process.” ~ FUSD

The following dress code applies to all sexes and genders, and will be enforced at the school site, and all school activity locations: any apparel, hairstyle, cosmetic or jewelry, even if not specifically mentioned below, which creates a safety concern, draws undue attention to the wearer, or which tends to detract from the educational process is not acceptable.

1. Every high school student must have in their possession a valid student I.D. card.
2. Clothing, hats, beanies, Do-rags, or accessories with logos/mascots of professional sports is prohibited, (e.g. Raiders, 49ers, Oakland A's, Dodgers). Any clothing or accessories depicting bulldogs (word or image of) such as Fresno State Bulldogs and Georgetown Hoyas are not acceptable. Gang-related symbols, insignias, or “colors” are not to be worn or displayed. Any clothing item or accessory that is over 50% bright red, or bulldog red, will not be permitted. Likewise, any clothing that is over 50% royal blue, or Dodger blue, will not be permitted.
3. Clothing with lettering or drawings which depict sexually suggestive expressions or actions, profanity, obscenity, drugs, alcohol, or tobacco, or which degrade the integrity of individual groups may not be worn.
4. See-through or sexually suggestive apparel, which exposes the body or skin in a sexually suggestive manner, is not acceptable. No undergarments may be revealed. Underwear-type sleeveless shirts, spaghetti straps or any top (e.g. tube tops, bandos, and halter tops) that does not completely cover the midriff and torso are not allowed.
5. Dresses, skirts, and shorts must not be more than 4 inches above the knee.
6. Attire, which may be used as a weapon, may not be worn (e.g. steel-toed boots, chains, items with spikes or studs).

ENFORCEMENT OF THE EDISON DRESS CODE IS THE RESPONSIBILITY OF ALL STAFF. Referrals will be made to the Vice Principals for appropriate action.

### Tardy Policy

In order to prepare college and career ready graduates, Edison High School enforces an on-time policy. Students are expected to be in their class and prepared to work prior to the sound of the tardy bell in every class, every day. Random Tardy Sweeps will be conducted campus wide. Students who are tardy or out of class at inappropriate times will have consequences assigned and parents will be contacted to resolve issues related to attendance and punctuality. Follow-up actions may include detention, loss of school privileges, and potential SARB processes. Friendly reminder, school starts promptly at 8:00 am. Tigers are punctual!!!



### Technology

Technology can serve as a great resource, but can also become a challenge in the classroom. Over the past 16 months, we have learned to apply our knowledge of technology to grow academically. ## Restorative Practices

Edison High School is a restorative practices site, striving to meet the academic, social emotional, and behavioral needs of students. Restorative practices consider the impact of behaviors on those who are harmed as well as the individual who inflicts harm. This approach is intended to improve relationships and behaviors for all students and staff, with an emphasis on the “whole child”. The premise for restorative practices is to restore relationships and effective social norms when expectations are not met for both the offender and the offended as well as any other individuals impacted by the action. It does not remove consequences, but rather, focuses on how to move forward and improve behavior in the future.

### In the Classroom

Restorative practices are an expectation at Edison High School. A restorative approach in the classroom strives to demonstrate the 4 Emotional Intelligence Skills of Self-Awareness, Self-Management, Social Awareness, and Relationship Management. An example of this restorative approach would include efforts to build relationships and rapport among students, between students and teacher and staff to staff. Mutual respect, high expectations with high support, and a community of caring help to improve behavior in the classroom.


### Class Meetings

Our monthly Class (We ACT) Meetings are designed to support restorative practices in the classroom and across the school. This time focuses on subject matter of building relationships, effective communication, cultural competencies, student interactions, participation, that are relevant, in order to prepare students for college and career. These are intended to support classroom climate, not to be isolated events.

### Reengagement Center Process

In order to support staff and students in building and repairing relationships, students who come to the reengagement center will be given the opportunity to reflect on the interaction in order to appropriately reenter the classroom through the use of a reflection tool. Each student will use this reflection tool as a guide for reentry into the classroom. When appropriate and agreed upon by both parties, students and teachers will be given the opportunity to meet in a restorative circle in order to repair the relationship and make things as right as possible.

# Edison's Academic Programs



## California Gold Ribbon School

21<sup>st</sup> century careers will require people to have critical and creative thinking skills that are linked to the fields of Science, Technology, Engineering, and Math (STEM). STEM is one of the fastest growing occupations; yet, there is a gap in qualified applicants in relation to job vacancies. If our country maintains the current state of education, there will be a shortfall of approximately 1 million STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering, and Math) professionals in the near future. In order to prepare and equip Edison High School students for the growing demands in the STEM related fields, Edison is a STEM focused school that promotes four years or more of Math and Science as well as four STEM Pathways: Biomedical Science and Technology, Computer Science, Engineering Design and Development, and Green Energy and Technology Academy (GETA).

### All Students—Four or More Years of Mathematics and Science

In order to expose our students to the academic rigors of post-secondary education and to qualify for Entry Level Mathematics (ELM) exemptions prior to enrollment in the CSU as well as prepare them for the growing careers in the STEM fields, students are enrolled in four years of mathematics and science at Edison High School .

### STEM Pathways

The development of career-themed pathways has increased the offerings of instructional experiences that go beyond the classroom, helping students see the application of learning in the real world and exposing them to the expectations of life beyond high school. All pathways incorporate technology. Pathway courses offer students an opportunity to develop the critical thinking skills necessary for college and career readiness.

### Green Energy and Technology Academy

Green Energy and Technology Academy (*GETA*) is in its 11th year of implementation. GETA is a program in partnership with California Department of Education (*California Partnership Academy*) and PG&E. This is a three-year program (*10th-12th grade*) offering rigorous classes in electronics, lab safety, and photovoltaic energy.

Our other three pathways are modeled after the nationally recognized Project Lead the Way which provides robust training and resources for teachers.

### Engineering Design and Development

The Engineering pathway is in its tenth year of implementation and continues to boast very dedicated and active freshman, sophomore, junior and senior cohorts. It consists of a sequence of four engineering courses where students are exposed to Computer-Aided Design and Drafting (CADD), vex robotics, mechanical and electrical engineering.

### Biomedical Science and Technology

The Biomedical Science and Technology Pathway is in its ninth year of implementation with all grades. It consists of a sequence of four biomedical courses where students are exposed to biology, medicine, anatomy and physiology, and psychology. Students enrolled in the Biomedicine pathway are likely to complete eight or more science courses before graduating.

### Computer Programming and Application Development Program

In the fall of 2014, Computer Programming and Application Development Program started. The Class of 2022 will be the fifth cohort to graduate. Students take two Computer Science Advanced Placement courses, and the goal of this pathway is to help the students become creators of technology and to improve their skills for designing, logical reasoning, problem solving, and collaborating.

# Edison's Academic Programs

## Advanced Placement Program

Did you know that Edison High School offers more AP courses than any other school in Fresno or Clovis? The Advanced Placement



(AP) program was created by College Board (<https://www.collegeboard.org>), which offers college-level curriculum and examinations to high school students in many subject areas. The curriculum is designed to attract and challenge students who have strong reading, writing, and critical-thinking skills who are interested in challenging themselves in preparation for post-secondary education. At the conclusion of the school year, students who take and pass an AP exam with a score of 3 or higher may be able to receive college credits. ### Counselor Welcome

Edison has a fantastic team of school counselors ready to serve your child! The counselors are divided by grade level and alpha (see page 6). Your child's counselor will be with them all four years at Edison. Our team consists of eight counselors and a head counselor. Counselors can help support with academics, personal, social or college questions. We are an excellent first stop to find the information you need. Your child can request to see their counselor by emailing them or connecting with them through Teams, and by visiting the Counseling Office in the Administration South building before school, at break, at lunch or afterschool and completing a Counselor Appointment Request Form. Students and parents are welcome to email or call their counselor as well. You can find their contact information in the Important Numbers to Know page in this packet. Information on schedule distribution and late registration is also below. Have a great summer and we look forward to the 2021-22 school year!

### Student Schedules

Student schedules are reviewed by our counselors and should reflect both graduation and college entrance requirements (A-G), and the master schedule was developed based on the requests your child made in the spring; however, if you feel there is an error in your child's schedule, your child will have the opportunity to request a change of program if:

- There is a class missing that your child needs for graduation or CSU/UC requirements
- Your child already passed a class during summer school

We cannot accept requests to change to a different teacher or move a class to a different period. We may not be able to accommodate a request for an elective change due to limited space and availability. Requests for schedule changes that are not a result of the bulleted items above will require parent notification.

### Post-Secondary Testing Dates

Don't forget to register for the SAT or ACT. Multiple exposures and practice make a difference. You can also use free online tools like Khan Academy and Tutor.com to help you prepare.

# School Bell Schedules & Operations



## Parking, Drop-Off & Pick-up

Edison High School values the safety and security of our students, staff and visitors. Our Administrators and Campus Safety Assistants start arriving at 7:00am. The main office opens at 7:30am and closes at 4:30pm.

If you are dropping your child off, we recommend early arrival to avoid congestion and traffic. Dropping your child off by 7:30am will ensure they will be on-time to class. Keep in mind heavy traffic begins after 7:30am. For families who transport their child, we ask that students be dropped off and picked up in front of the school due to heavy vehicle and pedestrian traffic in the parking lot.

## Student Parking Permits Required

All students who drive to school must obtain an EHS Student Parking Permit from our Financial Technician, Mr. Yang. Parking Permit Applications will be available on August 12, 2021. Students are required to complete an application, and provide a copy of their CA driver's license and car registration. We will start enforcing Parking Permits beginning August 26, 2021. Parking Permits must be hung from the rearview mirror and be visible. Due to the Gym Renovation Project, there will be a limited number of parking spaces allowed for our students. Student parking will be allowed in the South Parking Lot ONLY. Students are not allowed to park in the North Parking Lot or any other reserved places for staff and visitors.



## Student Medication

Students may NOT carry medications on campus without proper approval. In order for medication to be administered at school, a Medication at School Form must be signed by the parent and physician and renewed each academic school year. All medications, including inhalers, prescription meds, & over-the-counter meds are to be reviewed by the School Nurse and kept in the Nurse Office in a locked cabinet. Any emergency medication, such as glucagon, EpiPen and inhaler can be carried by student with a written order from a physician and cleared by the School Nurse.

*Education Code Section 49423 defines certain requirements for administration of medication, "..... any pupil who is required to take, during the school day, medication prescribed for him/ her by a physician, if the school district receives (1) a written statement from such physician detailing the method, amount, and time schedules by which such medication is to be taken and (2) a written statement from the parent or guardian of the pupil indicating the desire that the school district assist the pupil in the matter set forth in the physician's statement."*
